On Sunday, August 21st, the "CDMC Spectacular Seven" met at Raven Lodge, ready for adventure. We had an early start to a very long day of hiking. The weather was perfect for us as we headed out, stopping for short breaks and blueberries along the trail as we enjoyed the beauty around us along the way. Our route took us over Piggot Creek, past Lake Helen Mackenzie, up to the Ranger Cabin, past Hairtrigger Lake, and down to Whiskey Meadows. We had a side-trip to visit Sids Cabin on the way by and stopped for a lunch break at the Duck Pond before continuing on up to the ridge where the cool breeze helped us along in the sunshine as we headed to our camp spot up above the saddle to Frink. The wind was gusting and very cold at our destination, so campsites were quickly established, dinner made and eaten, and we tucked into our tents for an early night.

Our second day started early with a beautiful sun rise, and with the very cold wind still gusting we were kept moving to keep warm as we had breakfast and packed up to continue our trek. Heading off to Mt. Albert Edward, we left our packs below the summit and climbed up to the top to enjoy the views as the morning clouds lifted away from the top of the mountain. The air was still cool while we took photos from the summit and checked out our route for the rest of the day. We made our way back down to our packs and continued our hike down the shoulder of Albert Edward, taking breaks along the way for photos, snacks, shade, and sun with lots of stories and laughter shared along the way. After a short break in the meadow at our lowest elevation point for the day, we made the climb up to Ruth Masters Lake, arriving at 4pm with lots of time to set up camp and do some exploring before dinner. A wonderful evening followed as we enjoyed the company of the group in this beautiful setting.

On our third day, we started off early before the heat of the day to make the climb up from Ruth Masters Lake to the starting point for the route to the summit of Augerpoint Mtn. Only two of the group opted to make the climb up to the summit for some photos and views while the others enjoyed a break in the sun before everyone continued the trek upwards and across the ridge above Jack Shark Lake. The views were breathtaking from the ridge and many photos were taken to capture them as we traversed to the awaiting tarns and shade for our next break. After a coolingdown rest stop, we finished our days journey at a lovely tarn on the ridge overlooking Buttle Lake at 3pm, with time for naps in the sunshine, exploring wanders over the ridge, dinner, and stories of past treks over the many mountains surrounding us.

Day four gave us the luxury of a later start before we packed up and started off. Shortly after leaving camp most of us dropped our packs to make the short journey to the summit of Northwest Peak to enjoy one last view of the surrounding peaks before we started the long hike down the steep Augerpoint trail. The forest offered shade and a wonderful variety of plants, trees, and birds to identify along the way and we enjoyed several rest stops as we made our way down. Arriving at the end of the trail, we made the short walk down to an access to Buttle Lake and everyone enjoyed the refreshing waters while we waited for our shuttle to arrive.

highlights from the trek:










