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# **Trip Report**

Cape Scott (hiking) return to Reports list

Fri Apr 14 to Mon Apr 17, 2017

Friday April 14th, 2017

Two vehicles left Courtenay at 1:15pm and headed towards the northern end of the island. After a brief fuel stop near Port McNeil at about 4pm, the group continued on into Holberg for an extremely pleasant dinner at the Scarlet Ibis. With tummies full we traveled on and reached our campsite near the trailhead at about 7:45pm. After setting up tents and a few rounds of dice most were in bed by 9:30 with dreams of clear skies and sunshine for the next morning.

Saturday April 15th

Rising just before 7am, the group packed up and donned their raingear and headed up the 17km trail just before 9am. With only 2kms to go, the sky clearing overhead and bellies rumbling for dinner we hurried up the trail and arrived at Nels Bight about 6pm. Tents were put up in short order, dinner was eaten and after some socializing with the other CDMC group camped nearby, most headed for a much deserved rest by 9:30pm.

Sunday April 16th

After a leisurely morning sleep in, a visit from the Easter Bunny and goodbyes to the other group as they headed up the trail, we prepared for some beach and lighthouse exploring. With the group splitting into two, one group decided to spend the afternoon exploring the beaches only, while the other group headed up the trail to the lighthouse on the inland trail and then walked the beaches coming back. With the sun poking through and the skies eventually clearing off it was a lovely temperate day for soaking up the views and history. Everyone met up again at dinner time and shared tales of their day over dinner and campfire then turned in early, knowing that it would be a long day out the next day.

Monday April 17th








